Hope to see you there.



Beginning January 1, 2026, Premium Council Membership will be \$400 per person. This fee includes eight dinner meetings (each typically \$55 per person, offering a \$40 discount overall) as well as the \$50 annual dues, resulting in total savings of \$90 per year.

**GUEST SPEAKER AT OUR FEBRUARY 18TH DINNER MEETING
VICE ADMIRAL WILLIAM BURKE, USN (RET)**



Vice Adm. (ret) Burke, a native of Hornell, N.Y., graduated from the United States Naval Academy in 1978 with a Bachelor of Science in Systems Engineering. In 1985, he completed a Master of Business Administration at Marymount University. In 1999, he earned a Master of Science degree in National Security Strategy at the National War College in Washington, D.C. He is a graduate of Massachusetts Institute of Technology Seminar 21 Program in International Politics.

His submarine assignments include USS Lafayette (SSBN 616), USS Key West (SSN 722), USS Omaha (SSN 692), USS Cavalla (SSN 684), and command of USS Toledo (SSN 769). He commanded Submarine Squadron Two from July 2001 to July 2003.

His Washington D.C. shore assignments include a tour in Chief of Naval Operations' Attack Submarine Division; assistant deputy for House Liaison in the Navy Office of Legislative Affairs; Chief of Training, Doctrine, and Assessment; Assistant Deputy Director for Combating Terrorism (JCS J34); and head of Warfighting Assessments Branch (N812) followed by a tour as the Executive Assistant to the Vice Chief of Naval Operations.

Promoted to rear admiral in Sept. 2005, his flag assignments include Commander, Logistics Group Western Pacific/Commander, Task Force 73/Commander Navy Region Singapore; Director, Assessment Division (N81/N00X) and the Director, Quadrennial Defense Review (QDR/N00X).

In April 2010, he was promoted to vice admiral and reported for duty as Deputy Chief of Naval Operations for Fleet Readiness and Logistics (N4). His final assignment was as Deputy Chief of Naval Operations for Warfare Systems (N9).

Burke wears the Distinguished Service Medal (two awards), Defense Superior Service Medal, Legion of Merit (three awards), Meritorious Service Medal (three awards), the Navy and Marine Corps Commendation Medal (four awards), and the Navy and Marine Corps Achievement Medal (two awards). While onboard Cavalla, he received the Admiral Chick Clarey Award for the 1992 Outstanding Navy Officer Afloat from the Honolulu Council of the Navy League.

A GOLDEN GIRL: ME AND THE USS JASON DUNHAM

The author attended the ship's christening in 2009 and the commissioning in 2010 at Port Everglades Florida

January 17, 2026

This weekend, some of the 300-member crew and some officers from the USS Jason Dunham will be spending the weekend in Allegany County. It was explained to me that while this may be the first Cpl. Jason Dunham Weekend it is not the last. It was initiated by the Navy and is part of protocol for the ship's crew to visit its namesake's hometown and family. It may happen in the future depending on what the Navy is doing.

Some of the most meaningful moments in my life came from my coverage of the Jason Dunham tragedy. I'm not talking about awards or accolades; I'm talking about personally meaningful moments.

As a result of my courtesy towards Dan and Deb Dunham during one of the most terrible times in their lives, the loss of their son Jason, I experienced some of the most meaningful moments of my career and life.


I was in the crowd that sunny day in Maine, Aug. 1, 2009, at the Bath Iron Works when Deb Dunham pounded a champagne bottle on the massive hull, christening the USS Jason Dunham and launching it into the blue Atlantic Ocean. The sky was full of colorful confetti, and a band played loud music. The dock side audience was full of the bright, white, uniforms of the crew.

The USS Jason Dunham was the first United States Ship to be named for a noncommissioned officer. It joined the ranks of the USS John McCain and The Sullivans and many more.

I couldn't help noticing the irony of its DDG 109 designation. As a child of the 60's, that number on the side of a boat has a significant meaning to me.

The trip to Bath, Maine was special to me because Maine is one of my all-time favorite places. If I didn't live here, I would live there.

The respect I showed the Dunham's had led to an invitation to the Medal of Honor ceremony held in the East Room of the White House on January 11, 2007. The room may have been callously destroyed, but my memories of that ceremony amid the pomp and historical beauty of the room is intact in my memory and always will be.



On November 13, 2010 the USS Jason Dunham was commissioned at Port Everglades in Florida between Fort Lauderdale and Miami. I was literally aboard via an invitation from the officers and crew.

I had flown into Jacksonville on the 11th. and because of my late arrival, I spent the night wandering the airport. The next morning, I was picked up at the airport by a Navy escort and delivered to the Naval Air Station in Jacksonville where the USS Jason Dunham was moored. I climbed on board with others who had been invited to the ceremony. We spent the rest of the day

touring the ship while sailing the 260 nautical miles to Port Everglades near Miami. I still bear the scars on my left shin from banging it on the deck as we climbed through the shafts that led us from deck to deck.

That night, Commander M. Scott Sciretta played with us demonstrating the maneuverability of the guided missile destroyer and knocking our sea legs out from under us with quick turns and splashing those of us on the aft deck with the warm water of the Atlantic when he suddenly backed up.


Later I slept in the crew's quarters in an iron cubicle four inches off the deck and not tall enough to lift my book high enough from my face to read. It was a physical reminder as to why young people fight our country's battles.

Early the next morning I watched from the deck as a rising sun lit a bright pathway across the ocean while the Atlantic rose and fell around us. My father, a Navy veteran from World War II, had told me about sailing the Atlantic. I left his dog tag on the warship as a kind of coming full circle.

The next day, the docked ship was festooned with red, white and blue bunting from stem to stern and from towers to decks. In their sunlit, white uniforms the crew lined the decks, and gangways draped in banners. It was a thundering, breath taking, heart beating scene full of drama and patriotism and a moment in time I will never forget.

It was all because I respected the privacy of grieving parents, the way I was brought up to.

Support Sea Cadet Funding in 2026 Defense Appropriations!

1827 actions taken

173 needed to reach next goal

The Issue

The U.S. Naval Sea Cadet Corps is a federally supported youth program that provides hands-on training to approximately 8,000 participants each year. The program develops skills in shipbuilding, cybersecurity, aviation, skilled trades, and maritime operations. Nearly half of graduating cadets enter military service.

Congress authorized \$4.3 million in supplemental funding for the Sea Cadets in the FY 2025 National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA), but these funds were not appropriated due to the passage of a full-year continuing resolution. In December 2025, Congress again authorized \$4.3 million for the program in the conference version of the FY 2026 NDAA. However, members of the House and Senate must still approve this funding in the conference report for the Department of Defense Appropriations Act, which has not yet been released.

The House-passed defense appropriations bill fully funds the Sea Cadets under the Recruiting and Advertising section of the Navy's Operations and Maintenance Budget. The Senate's draft does not include this provision. Until negotiators agree to include Sea Cadet funding in the final appropriations bill, the program's funding remains uncertain.

The Solution

If enacted with the relevant provision, the FY 2026 Defense Appropriations Bill would make available the \$4.3 million authorized in the FY 2026 NDAA for the U.S. Naval Sea Cadet Corps. The appropriations process determines whether authorized funds can be spent. As of December 2025, a conference report for the appropriations bill has not yet been released. Ensuring that the conference bill includes Sea Cadet funding will secure the program's financing for next year, provided the House and Senate pass the negotiated bill.

Why You Should Take Action

If appropriated funding is not provided in FY 2026, the Sea Cadet program may face reduced training opportunities and higher costs for participants. The program relies on federal funding to maintain robust training and keep participation affordable for families. Its mission is to support national security workforce development and provide career pathways in defense and maritime industries. The Sea Cadets have historically received funding in appropriations legislation, and continued support is essential to sustain this critical program.
